

Uniform Video Services

In December of 2006, Governor Granholm signed legislation to promote competition in providing video/cable service in the State of Michigan. This legislation is known as the "Uniform Video Services Local Franchise Act". The Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC) is the agency designated to implement the Act.

If customers have a complaint about video/cable services, they should first attempt to resolve the issue by directly contacting their video/cable company. However, if customers are not able to resolve their complaints with the company, they may contact the MPSC for assistance.

WHERE DO YOUR PROPERTY TAXES GO?

Where do your property tax dollars go? As displayed in the pie charts above approximately one-third of every tax dollar goes to the City of Douglas. The other two-thirds of every tax dollar goes to Saugatuck Public Schools, Ottawa Area Intermediate School District, State Education Tax (SET) and Allegan County. Although the City performs all of the assessing, billing, mailing, collecting and disbursing, only the administration fee (1%) of the winter tax bills remains with the City.

The City's approximate 33% is made up of two millages. The City Operating Millage which is levied at 11.2004 mills and the Road Millage levied at 1.8814 mills has not changed since Douglas became a City in 2004. Our City Charter allows for a total of 20 mills to be collected, but the city council has elected to maintain the total city tax levy at just over 13 mills.

The City Operating Millage is the main source of revenue for the City and goes into the City's General Fund. The Operating Millage represents two-thirds of the City's General Fund revenue. The General Fund is used for most of the City's operating expenses, such as police department operations, Department of Public Works operations, administrative employees, contractual consultants, and minor equipment and vehicles. The Road Millage can only be used for road construction, repair and maintenance. The Road Millage is used to help fund the Major and Local Street Funds. Monies received from the State for City roads accounts for less than 30% of the necessary funding for road maintenance each year.

*100% PRE (Principal Residence Exemption) Homestead is exempt from School Operating Millage. To qualify for a Principal Residence Exemption, this must be your principal Michigan residence and you must own and occupy the property by May 1st of any given year.

**Winter Millage rates are 2007 actuals; 2008 rates are not yet available.

Summer tax statements are mailed the first week in July and are due by September 14th. Winter tax statements are mailed the first week of December and are due by February 14th. Uncollected taxes are turned over to Allegan County on March 1st of each year.

To calculate taxes multiply your Taxable Value by the millage rate and divide by 1,000.
 Example: \$150,000 taxable value x 31.8348 divided by 1,000 = \$4,775.22.

Digital Television Transition: February 17, 2009

Congress has mandated that all full power, over-the-air broadcast stations return the analog spectrum they are currently using to the government and begin broadcasting exclusively in digital format effective February 17, 2009.

If all of your television sets are hooked up to cable or satellite, you will not be impacted. This is not a cable problem.

If your television is not connected to cable and receives a picture with the help of "rabbit ears" or an outside antenna, it will stop receiving signals on February 17, 2009.

In order to continue to receive a picture on your analog television, you must either:

Subscribe to a pay TV service provider such as cable.

Purchase digital-to-analog converter boxes to use with current TV's (\$40 government-issued coupons are available by visiting www.DTV.gov)

Purchase a new digital TV.

Available coupons allow each household to request two \$40 coupons to offset the price of a digital-to-analog converter, which retails for up to \$70. These coupons will be good for 90 days from the time of receipt and can be used at electronic stores such as Best Buy and Radio Shack.

November 4th General Election

The November 4th General Election promises to be an especially busy day. Besides electing a new President, Douglas voters will select four council members. Council members Matt Balmer and Diane Bailey have both filed petitions for re-election. Newcomer Robert Sapita has also filed for one of the four available council seats. There is still time to register to be a write-in candidate to fill the fourth seat. Write-in candidates must file a declaration of intent with the City Clerk by Friday, October 31, 2008.

Voters must be registered by October 6, 2008 to be eligible to vote in the November election.

All voters are required to present a valid photo ID when requesting a ballot.

Voters may experience a wait to vote in this election. Please be patient so the election inspectors may assist everyone.

If you will be out of town on Election Day absentee ballots are available in the City Clerk's office until Monday, November 3rd.

Create a Workplace Recycling Program

So, how do you start recycling at work? That's what this article is about - to walk you through the process. If you already recycle at home, you'll find many similarities to office recycling. Start with just a couple of products. Once your program is up and running-add others. Eventually, you will have a flawless program in place.

THE RIGHT TO WALK ON THE SHORES OF THE GREAT LAKES

The Michigan Supreme Court ruled that the public has the right to walk "lakewards of the natural ordinary high water mark" as defined by the Great Lakes Submerged Lands Act, which is part of Michigan's Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act. The court outlined the history of the public trust doctrine in recognition by the courts that the sovereign must preserve and protect navigable waters for its people. The doctrine passed from the English courts to the American colonies, to the Northwest Territory, and ultimately, to Michigan. According to the court, landowners on the Great Lakes always take their title subject to the limitation of public rights under the public trust doctrine. The court held that the public trust doctrine in Michigan permits pedestrian use of the Great Lakes, up to and including the land below the ordinary high water mark.

Leaf and Brush Pick Up Schedule

LEAF PICK UP Oct. 1 to Nov. 30

Deposit leaves roadside in large piles, not in ditches. No garbage, pet waste, bricks, sticks, grass clippings or construction materials. Please place leaves in piles separate from brush.

BRUSH PICK UP Thru Nov. 30

Deposit brush neatly on roadside, not in ditches. Please place cut ends in one direction. No tree limbs larger than 6-inches in diameter or tree stumps. Please place brush in piles separate from leaves.

Residents utilizing a professional landscaping company should require material disposal as part of the contracted services.

Allagan Resource Recovery offers the following monitored sites to dispose of large bulk trash items. Appliances (two per year per household) and tires (four car or one tractor/semi truck per year) can be taken to the monitored site at Allied Waste in Hamilton, which is open the first and third Saturday of each month from 9:00 a.m. to noon. Residents must present their Resource Recovery Cards, which are punched once for each item. Allied does not accept other bulk trash items, however residents may contact their regular garbage companies, which may pick up bulk trash for an extra fee. The closest landfill disposal location is the Autumn Hills landfill, near Zeeland in Ottawa County, 700 56th Ave., Zeeland. Phone (616) 688-5777.

CONCERNED ABOUT DOUGLAS PLANNING AND ZONING ISSUES?

The City of Douglas is accepting applications to serve on the Planning Commission. Responsibilities include: reviewing site plans for special use, site condominium, planned unit development and subdivision requests to determine compliance with local and state ordinances; recommending zoning ordinance amendments; and reviewing, drafting and adopting a comprehensive plan for Douglas. Planning Commission members meet once a month, on the second Wednesday of each month. Availability, commitment year-round, and training session attendance is required. Send a letter describing your interest or stop in City Hall for an application.

A Reminder from the Zoning Administrator

Residents are reminded that the City's sign ordinance expressly prohibits private signs of any kind from being placed in public rights-of-way. Examples include, but are not limited to, political and candidate endorsement signage and real estate "For Sale" signs. Generally speaking, City roadway rights-of-way are 66' in width...33' from either side of the centerline of the roadway. We thank you for your cooperation.

DID YOU KNOW.....MICHIGAN WATER FACTS

- √ There are over 1,300 public boating access sites and over 80 harbors and marinas throughout the State of Michigan administered by state, county, and local units of government.
- √ Lake Michigan is so big that more than 400,000 gallons of rain or snow land on the Lake every second!
- √ Over the last century, the world population has tripled, but water use has multiplied six-fold.
- √ Washing machines may use up to 60 gallons of water per load. Dishwashers use at least 15 gallons per load while older toilets use up to 7 gallons per flush. Faucets flow water at 3-5 gallons per minute. A bathtub filled half full will contain at least 50 gallons.
- √ A continuous leak, caused by water leaking through the flush tank overflow on a toilet, can waste as much as 145,000 gallons of water during a three-month period. This would be an additional \$1,350 on your water bill.
